

Bottle deposits explained

Bottle deposits are in place to ensure empty bottles are returned so that we can reuse them. Whilst this involves an **initial** deposit payment, no additional costs are incurred if the number of bottles delivered is the same as the number of bottles returned.

If water consumption increases, or a bottle is not quite finished, a deposit is charged until the additional bottles delivered are returned. See the examples below:



Example delivery 1

Delivered		Returned		£ Charged
	+		=	£0.00
1 full bottle delivered (£6.00 deposit taken)		1 empty bottle returned (£6.00 deposit returned)		

Example delivery 2

Delivered		Returned		£ Charged
	+		=	£6.00
2 full bottles delivered (2 x £6.00 deposit taken)		1 empty bottle returned (£6.00 deposit returned)		

Example delivery 3

Delivered		Returned		£ Credited
	+		=	£6.00
1 full bottle delivered (£6.00 deposit taken)		2 empty bottles returned (2 x £6.00 deposit returned)		1 x £6.00 deposit credited to the account

NOTE: Prices may vary from the examples shown and are subject to VAT. Water is charged separately.
If a bottle is damaged or is returned with liquids other than water inside, contains foreign bodies or is unable to be reused, the deposit will not be credited.
